 A three-year funding agreement from NHS England who would provide 50% of the funding needed to run the programme.

The NDTi Small Supports programme 2022-2025

 A partnership led by NDTi with three small supports organisations: beyond Limits, C-Change and Positive Support for You

• A full-time Programme Lead with a Programme Co-ordinator

To work with up to 20 local authorities over the three years, setting out to support the
development of local small support organisations across England as part of the ongoing
work to move people with learning disabilities and autistic people out of mental health inpatient services including secure and forensic settings.

What is a Small Support Organisation?

Supporting people with complicated lives, traumatic life histories, experiences of institutionalisation and complicated support needs

Supporting people 'to move out of / or at risk of being placed in', a secure/forensic long-stay institution

- Voice: The person and their loved ones are at the centre
- Connection: A team of people recruited to support the person
- Relationships: Investment in positive and supportive relationships

Small Supports – Leeds 2022-2024

Objectives

- 1. Foster an environment where Small Support providers can flourish.
- 2. Establish high-quality, localised Small Support services in Leeds.
- 3. Provide up to 10 individuals with personalised support.
- 4. Demonstrate cost-efficiency compared to traditional care models.

Outcomes

Two new small support organisations: Unique Support Solutions (USS Ltd) and Mae & Mitchell (M&M)

Nine people supported; cost reduction across nine people of £209,000

Transformative impact on individuals:

- Independence and control
- Confidence and emotional growth
- Stable living conditions
- Community Integration

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A Deep Dive into the Plymouth Small Supports Experience – September 2024

Better lives, brighter futures: People explain the difference the support has made to their lives and how much more settled, and happy they are...consistently.

Improved Well-being: Across a group of 9 people their well -being scores rose from an average 2.6 to 8.3 out of 10. The economic value this improvement generated equated to £768,612.00 per year saving to the local system of services.

Reduced Public Service Useage: For six people where past history evidences need for multi-agency (including police and ambulance) response the small supports approach led to a dramatic reduction in the need for such response. The economic value of this equates to an annual saving of £950,159.00 to local services.

Reduction in care costs: Across 8 people the average saving in direct support costs was £28,000.



This report includes 10 people's stories and detail around individual improvements in well-being, reduction in incidents and explains the economic/financial calculations.

2022-2025 Outcomes

- Over the past here years NDTi have supported Norfolk, Doncaster, Wiltshire, Leeds, Cornwall, Lancashire, Bradford, NE & North Cumbria ICB (North Cumbria, Newcastle, North Tyneside, Gateshead, Stockton, Hartlepool), Birmingham and Solihull ICB, Devon, Plymouth and Torbay ICB, Bath Swindon and Wiltshire ICB
- There are currently 12 new small support organisations, within 12 months it is expected that there will be at least 10 more.
- There are five active organisations supporting 20+ people and growing each year.
- There is a national network of existing and new small support organisations providing peer-to-peer support. Currently there are 23 members.
- NDTi have published two key reports covering the evaluation of the Leeds programme and the longer-term impact of Beyond Limits in Plymouth.
- NDTi have developed an interactive guide to developing small supports currently only available to sites taking part in the programme.





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
